Dr. Donna Beegle



Donna M. Beegle, Ed.D. is a highly experienced National public speaker, discussion leader, trainer, and the author of "See Poverty, Be The Difference," a resource book for professionals who work with people in poverty. Donna has worked and written articles providing insights and strategies for communicating more effectively across race, class, gender and generational barriers for 17 years. Donna's inspiring story and work have been featured in newspapers around the nation, on local TV and on National programs such as PBS. Her work on poverty was featured in a Documentary titled: "Invisible Nation", in the Fall of 2008. Donna has worked with educators, justice professionals, health care providers, social service agencies, and other organizations all over the nation who want to make a difference for those living in the crisis of poverty.

Dr. Kim Schonert-Reichl



Dr. Schonert-Reichl is currently an associate professor in the Department of Educational and Counseling Psychology, and Special Education at UBC. For almost 20 years she has been conducting research focusing on the social and emotional development of children and adolescents especially in relation to school settings. She serves on many organizational and editorial boards, and committees dealing with children and adolescents' moral, behavioral and psychological development. Dr. Schonert-Reichl is an engaging speaker, who brings to every presentation a thorough understanding of the wealth of research about practices that effect developmental change. Her passion for the field and confidence in presenting the information meets the needs of any audience, which makes her a much sought after presenter.

Dr. Lee Brown



Lee Brown is a Post-Doctoral Fellow in the Department of Curriculum Studies at The University of British Columbia where he wrote his thesis entitled: Making the Classroom a Healthy Place: The Development of Affective Competency in Aboriginal Pedagogy. He is the co-author of the "The Sacred Tree", an educational curriculum based in Aboriginal values and epistemology. Lee has also contributed to the Round Lake Native Healing Centre during the last twenty-six years in a number of capacities including clinical supervisor and currently as a cultural resource to the centre. He has been the keynote speaker at many Aboriginal conferences including the Awassiss Education Conference held each year in Saskatoon. He has been an invited to share his knowledge of culture and healing in over five hundred indigenous communities in North America.

David Bouchard



British Columbia's best-selling author and sought-after public speaker, David Bouchard has presented to hundreds of thousands of educators, parents and students the world over. Through his keynotes and presentations, he champions literacy. He defines the roles and responsibilities of educators and parents in providing children with the gift of reading.

Bouchard shares his perspective: "We do not need new curriculum or harder working teachers in order to get our students to read. We need parents, teachers and administrators who read. The key lies in modeling." Bouchard outlines respective roles and responsibilities in ascertaining that all children are given the gift of reading.

Katy Hutchison



Katy Hutchison is a concerned parent, author and restorative justice advocate with a compelling, real life story. In this very personalized one hour presentation, entitled "The Story of Bob", Katy clearly describes how alcohol and other drug use, peer pressure, and misguided choices in an unchaperoned setting caused the tragic death of her husband Bob. Through a powerful and poignant multi-media presentation, Katy shares how this traumatic event impacted her as a wife and as a mother of two young children. Her personal and interactive presentation is designed to inform her audience of the risks arising from using alcohol and other drugs and unsupervised settings, and to empower them to make healthier choices so similar tragedies can be prevented. In addition, Katy explores the power of forgiveness and describes her own grassroots quest for restorative justice.

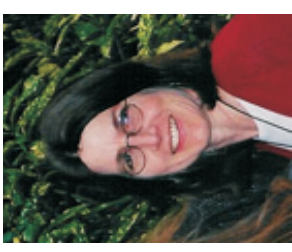
Kathy Lynn

She is the Parenting Education Advisor to the Council of Parent Participation Preschools in BC, and is an active member of the Canadian Association of Professional Speakers. Kathy serves on the Repeal 43 Committee which is seeking repeal of the Canadian law which permits parents and teachers to strike children. She and her husband have two grown children, and live in Vancouver, BC.

Dr. Martin Brokenleg



Dr. Martin Brokenleg is an enrolled member of the Rosebud Sioux Tribe of South Dakota and the father of three adult children. He is co-author of "Reclaiming Youth at Risk: Our Hope for the Future".

Dr. Brokenleg serves as vice-President of Reclaiming Youth International, a research and training institute for adults working with youth. He is currently the Director of Native Ministries Programmes and professor of First Nations Ministry and Theology at the Vancouver School of Theology.

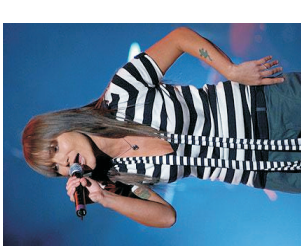
Ivan Coyote
